**Review 11/14/2012 Student Court Minutes with Mike Stearney:**

- ⑩ The Student Court reiterated the conclusions of the discussion with RHAA President Andrew Haugen.
- ⑩ We need to maintain a sense of representative legitimacy among all branches of SGA.
- ⑩ RHAA needs to publicly post their minutes to the SGA website.
- ⑩ The Student Court is investigating the Constitutionality of the restructuring of RHAA.

**Mike - Was SGA President Heba Mohammad expecting a formal response from the Student Court? Or will the current mediations taken by the Student Court suffice?**

- ⑩ There has been no SGA Student Court Writ of Certiorari issued, thus the complaint is not formal (i.e. no Writ of Ceriorari was submitted to the Student Court).
- ⑩ Point of Information: The Student Court does reserve the right to deny a Writ of Certiorari. But under the current circumstances the Student Court sees its informal investigation as a necessary process.
- ⑩ The Student Court will confer with SGA President Mohammad.

**Review the Final Statements of 11/14/2012 Minutes:**

**Quorum:**

- ⑩ There is no specific mention of quorum in RHAA Bylaws, but the Bylaws refer to Robert's Rules of Order on this matter.
- ⑩ The Student Court has found that according to *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised* 10<sup>th</sup> Edition, "In a mass meeting, or in a regular or properly called meetin of an organization whose bylaws do not prescribe a quorum and whose membership is loosely determined [...], there is no minimum number of members who must be present for the valid transaction of business, or – as it is usually expressed – the quorum consists of those who attend the meeting." (pg. 20-21).
- ⑩ Therefore, the Student Court does not recognize an issue of legitimacy of representative voting in the RHAA.
