- V. Guest Speaker: Amy Hennegis, Director of Health Services
 - a) I am joined by Mark who works with Prevea, Katie and Michelle who both work down in the wellness center.
 - b) Counseling increased to a 12-visit limit with additional triage appointments.



- John goes to Marinette location 2 Wednesday's a month with virtual days in between.
- Offer virtual session but it appears students appreciate being face to face. Working closely with MSW intern and counseling intern from Oshkosh. We are recruiting an additional full-time counselor.
- There have been 1594 visits this year.
 - 1. Last year was 1953 for the whole year.
- Reasons for visits
 - 1. Unspecified
 - 2. Anxiety and depression Stress
- The UW system has a goal of 1-1000-1500 students. We are at a 3.85 FTE. If we add additional counselor we will be at 1 student to 1912 students.
- GB had a higher counselor to student ratios then other campuses.
- c) Mark: Prevea started providing services with sports medicine and soon provided student health services in July of 2020.
 - University has done incredible job of bring students through one of the most difficult times.
 - Offer later hours on Tuesdays and Thursdays.
 - Hours on Saturday mornings
 - 1. Hasn't been as well utilized.



- We have clinics at branch sites that those students can utilize. They can use the urgent care for needs that you guys can receive here.
- Primary covid testing site.
- Different areas of services.
 - 1. NP nurses, virtual care, psychiatrists.
 - Provider will get back to you within an hour when open. Can prescribe medication all virtually.
 - 3. In July of 21 to February this year
 - a. Covid testing is 1300 visits. Main focus of services
 - 4. Offer a MyPrevea account. Use that to schedule appoints and message providers. View lab results.
 - 5. 63% of time is filled
 - a. You should be able to get in and be seen as soon as possible.
 - 6. Diagnosis for visits
 - a. Covid visits, coughs, sore throats,
 - b. Michelle can take care of anything from a primary care standpoint.
 - c. With a long-term conditions, they can help you out with that and getting in contact with you other doctors and refill medications. They can see information from your charts.
 - d. You can use this service even if Prevea isn't your main health care provider.
 - 7. Towards the end of the day usage drops off.

 - a. Covid tests and office visits
 - i. Sporadic times

 - Strategic initiative for the program of Bringing in the Bystander. Two days of training so far and one more on Wednesday. Hopefully launching more sessions.

- e) Questions and comments and feedbacks
 - Tristan: Ideas to enhance one thing I notice is on the website I go to sign up for an
 appointment and it says you can schedule online but it doesn't work, I always have
 to call
 - Yes we can expand we don't have an option for doing it online for counseling because we prefer to call. For health we have it open for all appointments somethings it might not offer but you should be able to pick a generic appointment but if it's not working we should bring that up to IT.
 - a. It always directs me to a phone call.
 - Alexis: What would the new counselor look like for the other campuses
 - 1. We are planning to have 10 percent be designated to the Marinette campus and brings John's job position back here. We are planning to continue our



contract into the next years. Evaluate the utilization on that as well. There is room for more students to use services.

- Zea: On the sexual assault event, where is that?
 - 1. The alumni rooms with a big disclaimer on the outside
- Tristan: I am wondering who is paying for the 10 percent commitment to go to
 Marinette. Is that coming from GB?
 - 1. Marinette seg fee. Sheboygan and Marinette are paying for the contract
- Abbi: I like how accessible it is to get covid tests. It has been helpful to have it on campus.
- Ted: I have gotten tests on, and off campus and it is so much easier on campus
- Alexis: One thing is writing a notice on the posters and leaving it out somewhere students are frequently passing by. An announcement saying they have these hours.
 - a. Poster that promotes later day and Saturday hours.
 - b. Digital signage
 - i. Meg: if the hours are accurate on the website that would be helpful. A lot of the hours of the websites are wrong so if they are right on the website they will have that information
 - ii. Is that to the wellness center specifically
 - I don't know specifically but if it is on the university website it is probably not right



- 2. Madelyn: The digital is a good idea, but I also check my email five times a day so if it was sent thorough the chancellor or send out an email to update the hours would be a good idea.
- Natalie: A promotion idea was a banner on the wellness center website. Like when you first click the website that pops up
 - a. The medical side has separate hours from the counseling side. Good idea but would have to be very specific. I don't want people to miss that part.
- 4. Cora: Looking at the general website it might be worth it to put hours in the little sections for different things. Having it right there would be helpful.
- Tristan: I have been looking online at services and while some of them are free you
 might want to advertise some of the prices, so they know. If we were to know how
 much it were to cost out of pocket then we might seek services.
 - 1. That might be tough because people come in for different things and our price list is all the same. I don't know if it would be possible. The prices you pay are markedly reduced for students versus if it was billed to your insurance. Would it be helpful to have generic prices like they are discounted?
 - a. I have no idea how much a lab services is and it would be nice to know the prices for those things before I make an appointment.
- Cora: Include a list of general insurances and whether they are excepted through
 Prevea.



- 1. Mark: most of the insurances you have around here you we would take. We could try to put that out there. You can use your insurance for things. There are quite a few things that don't cost anything. The insurance company has to send the claim to the owner of the insurance. Things don't cost a lot and if they cost money it is really inexpensive.
 - a. One of the reasons it gets challenging is that if someone needs a lab but if you come in and need something done. If you don't want to pay out of pocket and want to bill insurance we always have you call your insurance to make sure it is taken. Even if we take your insurance you still might be billed because the deductible was not met.
 - i. If you do use your insurance it is paid for the regular price not the discounted rate. We will send it to aurora or Bellin if that is better for your insurance.
- 2. Amy: Is it correct that if a student wants a sti test and they don't want parents to see they can pay out of pocket and not bill to insurance
 - a. Yes pay out of pocket. Everything is confidential. Anything paid for by insurance is sent to the person who owns the insurance
- Cora: Maybe partner with the Kress and promote physical activity. Being a part of that and promoting that.
- Tristan: Since the contract took over have we lost any services



- 1. No. That was part of the RFP. It had to start from where it was and was there additional things to add. Everything that was here is still here and some things were added to the services. Lab pricing is better now. The medications we have on site are less expensive. Nothing lost lots of things enhanced
- Katie: One thing we are focusing on is some of our community outreach has changed. Mainly to due covid. Hopefully that we will reconnect with some of those parties. More outreach.
- Plan B isn't offered anymore and that was important but that can still be prescribed you just have to pick it up from a pharmacy.
 - a. It can still be prescribed we just can't provide it thought the health center. For assault things we have a process and it can be then. They can prescribe you just have to pick it up at the pharmacy and you can pick it up over the counter without a prescriptions
 - b. We don't offer it as a system other than traumatic. Not even at our other clinics. We don't have any medications we provide in our clinics. Here we dispense more medication than our own clinics.
 - c. Katie: We want you to know that we work closely with the sexual assault coordinator.
- Jasmine: Idea for a health promotion activity. There isn't a lot of education on the intersectionality of health so maybe a forum that students can fill. Opening this up to other students.



- Hannah: my understanding that they cannot make appointment. If we can expand
 our modes that would be great for our university. Health promotional educational
 engaging experience that has to do with std and birth control and sex health in
 general.
 - 1. What would be the best way to get that information out?
 - a. Hannah: Make reservations on screens, posters, emails, and student engagement in the weekly student org email.
 - Jasmine: many professors are promoting certain events so if you email some professors they would promote in class
- Madelyn: Do you ever if someone comes in and don't want it prescribed do you
 ever promote going to planned parenthood?
 - 1. Yeah I guess that would be a safe option. I haven't done it but as far as the meds we have in the clinic we have oral contraceptives and sti testing so we do have a lot available. The only type of thing if you buy the medicine through the clinic with cash there is no paper trail. If you need to go somewhere like that would be like Nexplanon at our facility
 - a. Madelyn: Talking about sexual assault do you do sane examines
 - We don't have anyone certified on campus we send that to the St. Vincent ER.
 - b. Katie: We worked a lot with new cap and planned parenthood and we see patients and we do a lot of education. We give them the options and we direct them whichever way.



- 2. Zea: You might want to work with the pride center for STD testing.
 - a. We do partner with them, and our posters are outside their door
 - b. Katie: when a student comes in we recommend going that route when there is a clinic coming into the pride center. We do promote those.
- Conor: Promotional I love you are doing goat yoga. I think it would be cool if we could get therapy dogs to campus
 - a. Alexis. There are therapy dogs on campus it's called pause for paws.
- 4. Jasmine: Isn't that a temporary thing.
 - a. One more date left. Dr. Young had a therapy dog every Thursday.

 But if we could do that again that would be cool.
 - Alexis: I have been talking with people who ran that and they discussed doing that again.
- Braden: Idea for a health promotion activity. Would like to see a more education
 on recognizing signs. I would like an event that is like you may not realize but we
 want to help you realize it. Maybe guy specific that we don't talk about it.
 - Maddy: I think that is a good idea. People who don't have those issues can still learn about it.
 - Hannah: Something my high shoool did was called SOS signs of suicide.
 Training on how to respond to that.
 - Zea: There are different programs under different names. Something like that might be worth looking in to.

 - Zea: Speaking as someone apart of the community it is hard to get into SAIL
 so I think increasing it a good idea. One thing about sail is that parents don't
 know. You shouldn't have to be out to be safe
 - 2. Molly: Question about the relevance of couples. Is that relevant to have
 - a. Jasmine: As an RA we have been told that we are supposed to report it because we cannot have romantic couples together had they break up. Although that can happen between friends too.
 - 3. Meg: In support because it is only one building and one dorm.
 - a. It is the third floor of Robshaw and contemporary apartments



- b. Meg: Someone may not afford to live in the contempt's
- Alexis: it would be in best interest as it reflects dynamics of our community.
 Many students are in favor.

I didn't find it comfortable to live on campus and potentially end up with some guy who is transphobic or anything. Starting college as LGBT is terrifying and housing is a big part of that.

 Removing the stigma with the linguistics I would second Jasmines opinion that it doesn't require a specific gender or orientation
